

Ohio will raise flags to full-staff for Trump, Vance inauguration

Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine ordered flags on public grounds be raised for Donald Trump's inauguration on Monday and lowered the next day for Jimmy Carter

Flags at the U.S. Capitol and in multiple states, including Ohio, will now be flown at full-staff on Inauguration Day, despite a nationwide mandate for flags to be flown at half-staff in honor of former President Jimmy Carter.

Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine on Thursday ordered that state and U.S. flags on public grounds in Ohio be raised for the inauguration of President-elect Donald Trump and Vice President-elect JD Vance and lowered again Tuesday to honor the late President Jimmy Carter until Jan. 28. Vance resigned as a U.S. senator from Ohio as he prepares to become vice president. Vance grew up in Middletown and lives in Cincinnati.

U.S. House Speaker Mike Johnson announced that he has suspended the 30-day mourning period and will allow flags to be displayed at full-staff for the inauguration. Flags in eight other states, including Texas, Alabama, Tennessee and Florida, will also be raised on Monday.

So far, governors from at least eight other states have announced plans to raise the U.S. flag on Jan. 20th:
